Welcome...

The past year has seen our Padeswood site go from strength to strength as we have capitalised on previous investments. For example, thanks to the completion of our bypass project we have been able to push on with reducing the use of fossil fuels and increasing alternative ones, helping us cut CO₂ emissions significantly.

Along with our sister plants at Ribblesdale and Ketton, we are leading the way in reducing CO_2 emissions from cement manufacture in the UK. The next step to us reaching net zero is the installation of a carbon capture and storage plant at Padeswood, which would capture the CO_2 produced before it enters the atmosphere and store it safely under the seabed in Liverpool Bay as part of the HyNet North West project.

We have combined our successes in the reduction of our carbon footprint with improving our environmental performance with respect to noise and fugitive dust.

Minimising the impact of our operations on our neighbours is a key focus for us and we work with the Padeswood Liaison Committee and Natural Resources Wales to make sure we target the right areas. We have successfully partnered with expert consultants to identify items of plant for improvement and will carry on with this work throughout 2024.

CCS facility progressing

Plans are progressing for the development of a carbon capture and storage (CCS) facility at our Padeswood works.

Earlier in 2023, we held our non-statutory consultation where we presented our plans at public events and online, and invited feedback. There will be further opportunities to feedback on our proposed development next year when we will be engaging in a period of statutory consultation.

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Forest school is tree-mendous

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Pupils from three local secondary schools are benefiting from a forest school education using woodland at Padeswood works Eco Centre.

Pupils from Ysgol Treffynon, Richard Gwyn and the Referral Unit learn new skills including tree identification, safe and responsible knife and saw use, fire lighting, den building and cooking on an open fire.

Eco Centre Co-Ordinator Derek Hayes, who is also a level three forest schools' leader, said: "Pupils get involved in environmental skills such as growing plants, tree planting, path maintenance and habitat protection and creation, as well as being able to contribute to the process of creating compost from waste as we have built and are using a compost loo in the woods."

This year has also seen the introduction of an accredited award marking a pupil's involvement in environmental tasks at the Eco Centre. The John Muir Trust Environmental Award Scheme is divided into three categories – discover, explore and conserve.

A donation of 68 bags of cement from Padeswood works is helping to improve access to the new garden shop at Blacon allotments.

Gardeners at the allotments are upgrading facilities at the site. As part of the work, Highfield Gardening Association, which helps run the allotments, is seeking to improve access for wheelchair users.

The donated cement is being used to create a path from the entrance to the allotments to the not-for-profit shop, which sells produce to residents at greatly reduced prices and recycles out-of-date plants from supermarkets.
